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## Disposal of Unwanted Medicines During the COVID-19 Pandemic



During the COVID-19 pandemic, some community pharmacies may not be accepting medicines returns.

This is because pharmacies may have an increased workload with reduced staff numbers and also the risk of contamination of medicines being returned from settings that have had confirmed COVID-19 cases.



Care homes should update their risk assessments to reflect this current situation.

### **Storage**



Unwanted medicines awaiting disposal need to be stored securely with access restricted to authorised staff only.



A manager/ senior person will assess the existing storage arrangements and make any necessary adjustments to ensure that there is enough space to hold unwanted medicines awaiting return to the pharmacy/ collection from waste contractor.

### Records



Appropriate records must be maintained for unwanted medicines.



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#### **Medicines for Re-Use**



A manager/senior person should consider if an unwanted medicine is suitable for re-use in accordance with the NHS England and NHS Improvement standard operating procedure (SOP) on running a medicines re-use scheme in care homes and hospice settings.



This SOP details which and when medicines can be considered for re-use, including the need for storage in accordance with good practice guidance.

### **When Returning Unwanted Medicines**



If a local pharmacy is accepting unwanted medicines, to help reduce the need for pharmacy staff to handle the medicines, the following steps are advised:

- Wipe the outside of the bottle or packaging with a damp cloth using your usual detergent
- Place in a plastic bag
- Separate any medicines with needles or controlled drugs from other medicines
- Wash your hands for 20 seconds with soap and water or alcohol hand sanitiser after handling
